

Red letter day for Holton

The top-ranked Red Devils' girls volleyball eam won the Class C state championship with a 16-14, 15-8 victory over Pewamo-Westphalia.

KALAMAZOO - Never a doubt. From the start of the 1993-94 eason, the Holton girls volleyball eam planned a return trip to the lass C state finals, where they slanned to capture the state title hey lest last year.

The top-ranked Red Devils fol-owed through Saturday afternoon by tripping Pewamo-Westphalia 16-14, 15-8 to win the first state hampionship in school history.

Holton, which upended No. 3 lanover-Horton (15-11, 15-9) in the emifinals, rallied from a 12-4 Friday's quarterfinal round and

first-game deficit and then eased to the coveted title in the second

Amy DeLong and Jennifer Thornton, the Red Devils' 1-2 allstate punch, powered Holton to victory against the Pirates, who upset second-ranked Burton-Atherton in the semifinals.

"We knew we'd be back and we knew we'd win state this time around," said Thornton, the Red Devils' two-time all-state outside hitter. "We never had a doubt that we couldn't or wouldn't win this

"We set this as the goal (364) days ago and we followed through on it today.

Holton, which finished the sea-son with 47 consecutive victories and a 55-2-1 record, did have its share of adversity

The Red Devils played over the loss of injured Amber Trygstad in

Holton beat Suttons Bay without Trygstad in the quarters, then etilized the services of reserves Kelly Becklin, Dawn Long and Amy Vandenberg and Trygstad at 80 percent capacity to defeat Hano-ver-Horton and Pewamo-Westphalia in the respectively.

In the finale, Thornton recorded seven service points and seven kills, while DeLong registered 22 ssists, five service points, 10 digs and five blocks.

Long added seven service points, Lori Swenson six digs, seven kills and four blocks, and Erin Monette six kills and three blocks for Holton Jennifer Nichols chipped in three blocks. Long had seven service points, while Becklin had

Holton rolls to NCAA title

Different season, same result.

The Holton volleyball team, ranked No. 1 in Class C, rolled to its third consecutive Newaygo County

Athletic Association championship Saturday by steamrolling five opponents.

The Red Devils, winners of 40 straight matches, pounded Newaygo in the finale to claim the NCAA tourna-

ment crown and the overall conference Holton hitters Jennifer Thornton, Amber Trygstad, Erin Monette and Jennifer Nichols, fueled by the

quarterbacking of setter Amy DeLong, led Holton to a 15-6, 15-1 victory in the title match. The Red Devils, 142-12-9 over the last three seasons boosted their area-best overall record to 48-2-1.

"Winning the NCAA championship three years in a row is quite an accomplishment when you take into consideration the quality of the competition we face in this conference," said Holton coach Ed Bailey.

"I think this is an impressive milestone and quite a testament to the hard work and commitment these talented kids have put into making this program one of the state's best.

The Red Devils, who haven't lost a match in 1994, captured the crown in workmanlike fashion, clipping one team after another.

Guided by DeLong, a four-year starter and two-time all-state performer headed to the University of New Orleans next fall, Holton was barely challenged

Thornton and Trygstad provided the punch for the Red Devils, while Nichols, Monette and Lori Swenson delivered the knockout blows.

Holton, which outscored its five opponents by a combined margin of 150-43, posted a perfect 3-0 record in pool play by downing White Cloud (15-6, 15-3), Hesperia (15-4, 15-2) and Tri-County (15-5, 15-5).

The Red Devils then dismantled Kent City (16-14, 15-3) in the semifinals and tripped Newaygo in the

former under pressure and adversity. They've been on the brink of a state championship and they know what it takes to pull big victories off."

DeLong, Thornton and Trygstad led the Red Dev ils' statistical parade.

Thornton, a Class C all-state pick last year and generally regarded as one of the state's top hitters, registered 34 kills and 15 digs.

DeLong recorded 105 assists, 10 service aces, 30 digs and seven blocks, while Trygstad had 26 kills, 11 service aces, six blocks and 21 digs.

Nichols picked up 21 kills and seven blocks, with Kelly Becklin contributing nine service aces and Lori Swenson 13 blocks.

Sara Burde led Newaygo with 32 kills and 30 as-sists and Dusty Huismann added 35 kills. The Lions, which got to the finals by beating Tri-County, stand 29-11-4 on the season

Dana Swinehart added 14 service aces, while Karen Sullivan had 35 assists.

"We're happy to finish second, but we didn't play as well as we could have. We had a lot of peaks and valleys," said Lions coach Mary Reese-Pumford. "When we clicked today, we really played well. But when we were bad, we were real bad."





Agnes Gibson – Class of 1941

Agnes Gibson – Class of 1941



In a time prior to Holton's participation in conference affiliated athletics, Agnes Gibson was active in all sports, with an exceptional talent in softball and basketball. Gibson was also actively involved in school, serving as the vice president of her class also. Gibson and school classmates Lucylle Rossiter, Doris Gibson, Jean Syers, and Evelyn Hendrickson, who were leaders on the women's basketball team of the time, were also instrumental in the composition and selection of lyrics to accompany the music selection (adapted version of the Illini Fight Song) that is now the school's song. At this time, the school colors of red and gray were selected; however, during this time, uniform procurement for women's basketball and football was often difficult due to the availability of gray, and thus the school colors have become red and white.

Gibson has been described as being a physical athlete of her time that led the development of the game of softball at Holton High School. Playing without a coach, Agnes Gibson served as the pitcher of the softball team, and was described as the natural leader of the team. The softball team began playing non-conference games in 1939, 1940, and 1941, with Agnes leading the way to an undefeated season on the mound in her senior year of 1941. In addition to her success as a softball player, it has been noted that Gibson liked to play all sports and was an outstanding athlete in all that she competed in. Gibson also excelled in women's basketball and was a leader on that team as well.

Gibson and her teammates, which included Lucylle Rossiter, Evelyn Morrison, Grace Cripe, Marilyn Thill, Florence Hayes, Lillian Broderick, Barbara Stenberg, and Alice Trygstad, have been pioneers for women's athletics at Holton High School, led by Gibson herself.




One of the best all-around athletes of his time, Albert Wiegand was a four sport athlete who lettered in football, basketball, track and field, and baseball at Holton High School, while also having actively participated in the "H" Club, among other activities. Described by teammates as a strong competitor and outstanding all-around athlete, Mr. Wiegand was a member of many of the outstanding teams in the early history of athletics at Holton High School.


Among those teams, were the 1954 varsity football team, the school's first football team also being honored, and the 1955 and 1956 men's basketball teams. The 1955 men's basketball team was the first basketball team to win a district championship in the history of Holton High School, and the 1956 basketball team ended the season with a record of 18-3.

Mr. Wiegand was known for his tremendous speed and agility, and was a tremendous running back in football, was an outstanding shooting guard, ball handler, and consistent scorer in basketball, he ran sprints and relays in track and field, and he was an excellent center fielder in baseball.

After graduating from Holton High School, Mr. Wiegand would go on to serve more than 20 plus years in the United States Air Force

Todd Keas (112) defeated Robert Spear, Michigan School for the Blind, by a 5-0 score in overtime. Todd then defeated Ron Heiler, Dansville, 7-1 to enter the finals. Keas was injured early in the championship match and lost by default

Holton's champions were Brian Johnson in the 98-pound division and Clieve Young, wito won the honors in the 155 class.


Two others placers for Holton were Todd Keas, second at 112, and Steve Tomaras, third at 119.

Wrestling has finally returned to Holton. After four years wrestling is back in the winter sports program.


